

Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Brockport was held in the Conference Room, Municipal Building, 49 State Street, Brockport, New York, March 19, 2007 at 7:00pm.

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Wexler called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

REVIEW OF MEETING MINUTES: Mayor Wexler called for any additions or corrections to the minutes of the regular meeting held March 5, 2007.

➔ Trustee Castañeda moved, Mayor Wexler seconded, unanimously carried that the minutes of the meeting held March 5, 2007, be approved as written.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

1. Jeanne Moszak of 64 Brookdale Road distributed a letter and read it into the record:

When I first heard that there was going to be a stop sign on Brookdale Road to slow traffic, my first question was, "Is it legal to use a stop sign for that?"

So I did a little research. According to *Codes, Rules and Regulations of the State of New York, 17B Vehicle and Traffic Law, Section 211.3*, stop signs are for the right of way at intersections, which implies that they cannot be used anywhere else. It would seem that the recent placement of stop signs in mid block of Brookdale Road would not be in compliance with this code.

The *National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways*, adopted by New York State and to be used by all municipalities within New York State, states "STOP signs should be used if engineering judgment indicates that one or more of the following conditions exist: A. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law; B. Street entering a through highway or street; C. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or D. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign." None of these conditions exist mid block on Brookdale Road. The Manual also states "STOP signs should not be used for speed control." That is the reason given for placing the signs.

Have there been any engineering, traffic or speed studies done on the street?

I would be happy to see the signs removed as quickly as they were put up. They are a nuisance that has been placed primarily on the residents of Brookdale Road.

Mayor Wexler thanked her for her comments and said the Village will check into this. He shared that Police Chief Varrenti had given his opinion a couple of meetings ago and recommended against the placement of the stop signs. Mayor Wexler said the signs are not cemented in and can be removed if need be.

J. Moszak thanked the Board for hearing her.

PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETINGS: None

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

Mayor Wexler said the Village Manager would be making a brief presentation on the proposed tentative budget then the floor will be opened up to the public for comment. There will be no vote on the budget this evening. Trustee Wagenhauser submitted further cost cutting recommendations today for Board consideration. The budget must be adopted by May 1st.

Clerk Morelli read the following legal notice that was published in Suburban News on March 4th, posted on the Village website and bulletin board:

Legal Notice

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the Village of Brockport will meet in the Conference Room of the Village Hall, 49 State Street in the Village of Brockport on Monday, March 19, 2007 at 7:00pm for the purpose of holding a public hearing on the Tentative Budget of said Village for the fiscal year beginning June 1, 2007.

A copy of said budget will be available on the Village website at Brockportny.org and at the office of the Village Clerk, located at 49 State Street, on or after March 2nd during the hours of 8:30am and 4:30pm for the purpose of inspection by interested persons.

Manager Coyle said the tentative budget was distributed to the Board and made available to the public on March 2nd. He held three informational sessions on the budget. A total of 3 people attended these sessions plus one reporter. There was a range of questions and comments from these citizens from the cost of the police department to the conditions of streets to the compensation of the Village Manager position.

Manager Coyle made a power point presentation and made hard copies available to all in which he provided an overview of the spending plan and touched on some of the highlights and figures of the two major funds. (Refer to hard copy of power point presentation.)

→ At 7:05pm, Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Castañeda seconded, unanimously carried to close the regular meeting and open the public hearing.

Public Comment:

1. John Bush of 157 Barry Street said the benefits packages are a very large portion of the budget, particularly for the Police Department and the Department of Public Works. He said 7 Police Department retirees are getting approximately \$18,000 per year in benefits. They can retire 25 before reaching the age of 65 when Medicare comes into play and decreases the costs to approximately \$2,000 per year. He asked how long Village taxpayers could sustain paying these benefits. He said he knows the Village is currently in negotiations for a new Stetson Club contract, and hopes they are tough. He said the Union contracts are strangling the Village. He said he also thinks the Village should look into privatizing some things. He said taxpayers also pay for Monroe County Sheriff's Department. He said he spoke to the man from MCSD that is in charge of our area and that is a sham when people say MCSD can't respond adequately. J. Bush said he sees this big list of Brockport Police Department calls for service, but according to a dispatcher, sometimes one number assigned to a call can generate dozens of other numbers. He said it seems like someone is covering up something. J. Bush said he worked for the State and doesn't get these kinds of benefits. He urged the Board to look more closely at this.

J. Bush reminded the Board that he has been at many meetings and has continued to urge them to really work on the budget year round. He said some former Board members that were in office for 12 to 16 years always used to say they were doing a lot and ended up borrowing from reserve funds. That was left for this Board to clean up. He said it is commendable to "hold the line" on taxes, but more needs to be done. He said Village taxpayers pay twice the total taxes that Town of Sweden and Town of Clarkson taxpayers do. He asked what more they really get. He said there are new subdivisions being built on both the Clarkson side and the Village side of East Avenue. He said buyers would have to be cuckoo to build on the Village side. J. Bush reminded the Board that only 500 or so voters elected this Board of the thousands registered.

2. Linda Borraro of 155 Utica Street asked how often the Village Board has gotten together collectively to work on the budget not including e-mails, phone calls and private meetings.

Mayor Wexler said many Trustees have worked individually with Manager Coyle who then relayed their comments and recommendations to the rest of the Board. He said just today, Trustee Wagenhauser forwarded some recommendations to cut the budget further. They will be discussed at next Monday's workshop meeting as well as a discussion on non-union employee wages. Mayor Wexler said it is not Manager Coyle's responsibility to call meetings. He prepares and presents the budget. Mayor Wexler said Stetson Club contract negotiations are in process and the outcomes are yet unknown.

L. Borraro said she attends most regular and workshop meetings and noted that the Village Board has not met as a whole regarding the budget. Trustee Wagenhauser said the Board has discussed the budget along with other items at workshops, particularly the one last month. He said some Board members have not had much to say about the budget. L. Borraro said that she must have missed that meeting. Trustee Wagenhauser said there has been significant work done on the budget by not only Manager Coyle, but also some Board members.

L. Borraro said it just seems that separate budget workshop meetings are missing. She said the new age of e-mail is great, but thinks good discussion needs to take place. Trustee Wagenhauser said that has not proven very helpful the last two years. However, a lot of work has been done to get to the point of a flat tax rate or even a decreased tax rate. L. Borraro said it is too bad the public has missed the workings.

On another note, L. Borraro commented that she thinks Manager Coyle is doing a wonderful job, but questioned his proposed salary increase. She asked what percentage increase is proposed. Manager Coyle said 15%. Mayor Wexler said if one were to compare apples to apples considering our population and services, the salary of our Village Manager is very different than those of East Rochester or Fairport. He said he realizes that longevity in the position differs among them. Mayor Wexler said he is from a teacher mentality where everyone gets the same raise across the Board. However, in the business world one's education, experience, knowledge and work product can make a difference. The way to keep a good employee is to reward them financially. Mayor Wexler said Manager Coyle handles a lot of work and does a lot for his office. Mayor Wexler said he believes Manager Coyle is worth his weight in gold. However, the percent increase is not cast in stone yet and will be discussed at the next workshop.

L. Borraro said she is not saying I. Coyle is not worth it, but others do not get such a jump. L. Borraro questioned if the Board is looking to save only on this budget or are looking ahead.

3. J. Bush asked the dollar amount of Manager Coyle's salary. Manager Coyle said it is currently \$53,560 and he has proposed \$62,000 half through general fund and half through water fund. J. Bush said he doesn't necessarily dispute Manager Coyle's salary and that he can only do what the Board allows. He can only do so much. The Board needs to change the Union contracts since they are ruining the Village. He said there isn't a Village employee that can't afford to pay half of their benefits (medical and dental premiums). J. Bush said the only bargain taxpayers get is the Fire Department that is staffed with hard working volunteers.
4. Hal Legg of Gordon Street read the following statement into the record:

After 2006's increase of nearly 10%, I'm sure few residents expected our village leaders to propose a budget that would hold the line on taxes this year. Yet, to your credit, that is exactly where we are now.

I thought it was important to speak tonight because I wanted to share the appreciation of all the taxpayers who, like me, are pleased with your efforts to deliver the services we want at a price that's fair. Thanks are in order to you, Mr. Mayor, Madam Vice Mayor, esteemed Trustees, able department heads, and last, but certainly not least, Manager Coyle.

Of course, others will raise concerns about your work, a tradition we've all come to expect and respect. My hope is that you will hear them out, bearing in mind that you're just not going to be able to please everybody.

Regardless of these criticisms, most villagers rightly recognize this budget as the latest in a growing collection of good news about Brockport. Along with big issues, like the settlement of the police chief's contract; wide-ranging issues, like the plan from Trustee Wagenhauser to aid and support those wanting to improve their village property; ongoing issues like the continued effort to rehab the former Kleen Brite property; and emerging issues like the wisdom of convening a cross-sectional committee to meet head on the challenges that Main Street

reconstruction will bring, this budget is proof that our community is headed in the right direction and poised to pass a spending package well ahead of the May 1 deadline.

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Finally, not long ago disagreement among board members—sometimes-impassioned disagreement—was Brockport's headline. I pray that time has passed. The proposed budget clearly demonstrates that our elected officials can, will, and do set aside their differences to act in the best interests of taxpayers. That takes resolve, compromise, and old-fashioned, honest-to-goodness hard work. But the result is progress, and this village is happy to see it.

→ At 7:50pm, Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Castañeda seconded, unanimously carried to close the public hearing and re-open the regular meeting.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

A. PUBLIC WORKS – Superintendent Harry G. Donahue

1. Authorize Main Street Sanitary Sewer Smoke Testing – H. Donahue shared that he recently met with the Village Engineer to discuss identifying excessive infiltration and inflow (trouble spots) within the sanitary sewer system in the Main Street area. Chatfield Engineers provided a proposal to complete smoke testing at a cost of \$2,000 based upon a length of 5,000 linear feet. This includes labor and equipment. DPW would assist with maintenance and protection of traffic as needed.

Trustee Wagenhauser said these sewers from the early 1900's are proposed to be replaced. He questioned if it was still necessary to smoke test. H. Donahue said yes as it will help determine which homes have cross connections (lateral lines without approval).

Trustee Castañeda asked if another proposal was obtained. H. Donahue said he is not aware of anyone else who does this work in the area. Chatfield Engineers does a lot of this work throughout the county. Trustee Maziarz said Chatfield is our engineer.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Heyen seconded, unanimously carried to accept the proposal authorizing sanitary sewer smoke testing on Main Street to be completed by Chatfield Engineers with assistance from Superintendent Donahue.

2. Establish Schedule for Spring Pick-up – Superintendent Donahue said he would like to schedule the annual spring clean up for April 23rd – April 27th with the same rules and regulations and done by Max's Mardi Gras Parade. A notice will be placed in Suburban News and on the Village website.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Castañeda seconded, unanimously carried approving spring clean up for April 23rd – April 27th per rules and regulations provided.

3. Authorize Changes to Brush Pick-up Schedule – Superintendent Donahue recommended that the Board consider altering the current brush pickup schedule from monthly to every other month. Although DPW labor costs will remain the same, the personnel would be directed to new projects other than additional brush pickup runs. This frees up 5 employees for 3 weeks during the season. Therefore, the brush pick up schedule would be the last Monday of April, June, August, October.

Trustee Wagenhauser said this frees up 1,500 man-hours to spend on other needed work. Trustee Maziarz asked if residents would still be able to request that a truck be parked in their driveway overnight to fill with brush. H. Donahue said yes. Trustee Maziarz suggested that service be made known in the announcement. Trustee Heyen suggested that the reporters in the audience consider writing about this as well. Mayor Wexler said people are used to monthly brush pick up and will need to be informed of the change.

→ Trustee Wagenhauser moved, Trustee Heyen seconded, unanimously carried to amend the brush pick up schedule to be the last Monday of the following months: April, June, August, October.

4. Water Main Flushing – Superintendent Donahue announced the semi-annual water main flushing for April 16th – 18th. A notice will be placed in Suburban News and on the Village website.

→ Trustee Wagenhauser moved, Trustee Castañeda seconded, unanimously carried approving the semi-annual water main flushing for April 16th – 18th.

B. POLICE DEPARTMENT – Chief Daniel P. Varrenti

1. Calls for Service – number not provided

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2. New York State Sex Offender Registry Act – Chief Varrenti reminded everyone that this act allows Police Departments to disseminate information depending on the sex offender level: 1, 2 or 3 with 3 being the most serious with the greatest chance of recidivism. Although some Police Departments choose not to disseminate the information, the Brockport Police Department does as it more proactive. That may lead some to draw the conclusion that Brockport has an exorbitant number of sex offenders. He encouraged interested citizens to log on to the Brockport Police Department website to view the listing. Sgt. Philippy is the department's sex offender coordinator.

That being said, Chief Varrenti announced that a Level 2 sex offender is living within Village limits. His name is Levi Spikes, Jr., male black, 5'7", 150 pounds.

Mayor Wexler thanked Chief Varrenti for making certain that the community is informed, particularly the school districts and agencies dealing with children.

3. STOP DWI – Traffic Safety Awards – Chief Varrenti thanked Mayor Wexler and Trustee Heyen for attending the awards luncheon with him. Sgt. Philippy was the guest speaker as he is well renowned DRE (drug recognition educator) and a tremendous asset. He received a community service award. Officers Curley and Mesiti received STOP DWI awards as did the Brockport Police Department for the greatest number of DWI arrests for a department of its size.
4. Condolences – Chief Varrenti wished his condolences to Trustee Maziarz for the recent loss of her Aunt.
5. Budget – Chief Varrenti commented that there are just over 8,000 residents in the Village of Brockport that balloons to approximately 16,000 when you count SUNY students. Approximately 1,600 tax bills are sent out. However, only 3 residents attended the informational meetings on the budget, only 11 people attended tonight's public hearing on the budget, and only 3 people spoke. Congratulations and have a good evening.

C. BUILDING / ZONING / CODE ENFORCEMENT - Scott C. Zarnstorff (excused)

D. FIRE /AMBULANCE / COMMUNICATIONS - Chief Timothy Rombaut

1. Calls for Service – Chief Rombaut reported 209 fire calls year to date and 419 EMS calls year to date for a total of 628 calls year to date. Chief Rombaut commended the ambulance volunteers for picking up the slack when career staff is not available.

2. Membership Drops & Adds – Chief Rombaut asked the Board to consider approving the following drops: Mark Stoughton, Cathy Ryan, Nathaniel Loescher, Bill Huff and the following adds: Jennifer Nobrega (from Explorers to active fire and ambulance), Erik Bressingham to fire only, Corey Cunningham to Explorers, Cody Gilliam to Explorers, Gerald Weaver as a mutual aid member, Susan Mohney as a mutual aid member and Mark Warner from active fire to life status.

→ Trustee Castañeda moved, Trustee Heyen seconded, unanimously carried to approve the previously mentioned drops and adds.

3. Loan of a pumper – Chief Rombaut shared that our neighbors to the south, the Bergen Fire Department, had an accident with one of their pumpers on the expressway a few weeks ago. No one was hurt, but their pumper was struck and about \$20,000 damage was done. It will be out of service for almost 2 months while being repaired. Chief Rombaut said he offered Brockport's pumper 235 to use for the duration. They are interested. He requested the Board consider approving a mutual aid service agreement for the temporary loan of equipment / apparatus to the Bergen Fire Department. This would state that they are responsible for any damage or repairs while in their possession.

Trustee Maziarz said she is very excited to be able to assist our neighbors, but agrees that an agreement should be drawn up and approved by our Village Attorney. Trustee Castañeda asked Chief Rombaut if he had a sample agreement to modify. Chief Rombaut said he is in the process of getting one.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Castañeda seconded, unanimously carried to approve the

temporary loan of equipment / apparatus to the Bergen Fire Department pending Village Attorney approval through a mutual aid service agreement.

4. EMS STEP Conference – Chief Rombaut apologized for the late notice, but just learned that the early registration deadline is approaching for the annual EMS STEP Conference. It is in Rochester March 30th-31st. He requested permission to send 6 people at a total cost of \$630. This counts towards their recertification.

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Trustee Maziarz asked if the van would be used to avoid travel reimbursements. Chief Rombaut said yes, but that some are going at varying times, so some may opt to drive themselves. Trustee Heyen asked if they would stay within meal allowances. Chief Rombaut said meals are provided and are part of the registration cost.

→ Trustee Castañeda moved, Mayor Wexler seconded, unanimously carried authorizing 6 people to attend the EMS STEP conference at a total cost of \$630.

5. Wal Mart Grant – Chief Rombaut shared that he attended the Wal Mart grand opening and accepted a grant for \$7,000 for the Fire Department. He said Wal Mart has been a great supporter of the Brockport Fire Department for many years and they hope to keep that relationship. They are considering how best to put that money to work. It may go toward computer upgrades or some turnout gear.

Trustee Heyen asked if it would be made part of the Village budget. Chief Rombaut said no. It will be placed in the department's fund drive (donation) monies. This funds some "extras" for the volunteers beyond the bare essentials that tax monies fund.

VILLAGE BOARD REPORTS:

- A. Trustee Maziarz
 1. Budget – Trustee Maziarz thanked Manager Coyle for his work on the budget and for his presentation this evening. She also thanked Department Heads and Board members. She said although Board involvement in budget preparation may have been done a little differently this year, the process was efficient, streamlined and ultimately more effective. The end result of a zero percent tax rate increase with the possibility of a 1% tax decrease is positive.
 2. Farmers Market – Trustee Maziarz reported that planning is underway for the 3rd season of the Farmers Market.
 3. Smith Street Bridge – Trustee Maziarz shared that the Village has put together a petition that is available for signing through the first week in April. She has carried it to SUNY and the Brockport Merchants Association and Trustee Castañeda is having Village Advisory Committee members carry it. It is also available at the Village Hall. The petition reads as follows:

Smith Street Bridge Petition – March 2007

The Brockport area community considers the Smith Street Bridge a necessary part of the transportation system and a vital contribution to our quality of life. Therefore, we the undersigned:

1. Respectfully petition the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) to repair and reopen the Smith Street Bridge over the Erie Canal in the Village of Brockport prior to the commencement of the Route 19 (Main Street) reconstruction project and;
2. Respectfully petition the NYSDOT to continue ownership and maintenance responsibilities for the bridge, post-reconstruction, as the Village government is in no position, financial or otherwise, to assume these responsibilities.

- B. Trustee Wagenhauser

1. Budget – Trustee Wagenhauser responded to comments made earlier by J. Bush during the budget hearing. Regarding benefits, the Village is constrained by Union contracts and by law. Benefits cannot simply be cut, as they would be open to lawsuits. Regarding building in a new subdivision in the Village versus across East Avenue in the Town of Clarkson, his mother just bought into a new subdivision in the Village and is not “cuckoo”. Trustee Wagenhauser thanked H. Legg for his positive comments and stated that there are a lot of people very positive with the Village, its changes and direction for the future.

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C. Trustee Heyen

1. STOP DWI Traffic Safety Awards – Trustee Heyen said as a first time attendee of the annual awards luncheon, she was proud of the Brockport Police Department, the award recipients and one of our own being the keynote speaker.
2. Property Remediation Committee – Trustee Heyen reported that they are moving forward with remediation efforts for the former Kleen Brite properties. They are meeting with Elaine Miller again tomorrow regarding making application for brownfields funding. The BOA deadline was originally set for May 1st, but since the 2005 and 2006 funds have yet to be released, the 2007 deadline is somewhat flexible. There will be a formal notice of the application deadline. There are many steps in the process and the public will have an opportunity for involvement at a later date.
3. Budget – Trustee Heyen thanked all those involved for their efforts with the tentative budget preparation. She specifically thanked Trustee Wagenhauser for the time he has put in and said he probably knows it line by line.

D. Trustee / Vice Mayor Castañeda

1. Budget – Trustee Castañeda thanked Manager Coyle and the Department Heads for their efforts with the tentative budget. She agreed that a lot of Board communication was done through e-mail and individual meetings with Manager Coyle this time around.
2. Smith Street Bridge – Trustee Castañeda encouraged people to sign the petition. The original deadline for petitions was March 21st, but they will now be available through the first week of April.
3. Village Advisory Committee – Trustee Castañeda said the Village Advisory Committee needs additional members. She said the committee would be voting on a new Chair and Vice Chair at its April meeting.
4. Wal Mart – Trustee Castañeda reported that she, Mayor Wexler and Fire Chief Rombaut attended the grand opening of the Super Wal Mart in the Town of Sweden. She commended the Town for a job well done and Wal Mart for their generous community donations.
5. Meals on Wheels – Trustee Castañeda reported that she attended the Mayors for Meals event in Mayor Wexler’s absence.
6. Clean Sweep – Trustee Castañeda announced that the New York State Canal Corporation / Parks annual clean sweep is scheduled for April 21st and 22nd. Volunteers are needed. She has contact information if anyone is interested.

E. Mayor Wexler

1. Wal Mart – Mayor Wexler thanked Trustee Castañeda for attending the grand opening with him.
2. STOP DWI Traffic Safety Awards – Mayor Wexler commended the Brockport Police Departments and its award recipients. He acknowledged Chief Varrenti for a job well done as it starts from the Chief on down.
3. Budget – Mayor Wexler said the Board would further discuss the budget at the next workshop and consider a vote at the April 16th meeting.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

1. Joan Hamlin of 50 Park Avenue suggested that the Board not adopt a 1% tax decrease. This was done in the past to the Village’s detriment. She said she would rather have it remain the same than decrease that little bit.
2. John Bush of 157 Barry Street said he does not want to be misunderstood. He said the Brockport Police Department does a good job, but are well compensated for it. He further

commented that the home health care business is very lucrative and if he owned one he, too, could live anywhere he wanted to.

Trustee Maziarz said that was an inappropriate comment. Mayor Wexler responded that the Taylor Law plays a role in regards to employee benefits. Contract negotiations should be a give and take. Chief Varrenti said all should understand that members of the Brockport Police Department do not get any more benefits than members of other comparable sized police departments in the County. There are many lines in the contract. He recommended digesting the entire contract.

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AUDIT:

➔ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Heyen seconded, Trustee Castañeda abstained, as she had not yet reviewed all of the bills, carried that the bills be allowed and paid upon audit.
