

**Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Brockport was held in the Conference Room, Municipal Building, 49 State Street, Brockport, New York, September 2, 2008 at 7:00pm.**

**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Wexler called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**MISSION STATEMENT:** "To provide a high quality of life for all residents, exercising fiscal responsibility and preserving Brockport's unique heritage and historic character."

**REVIEW OF MEETING MINUTES:** Mayor Wexler called for any additions or corrections to the minutes of the last meeting.

➔ Trustee Legg moved, Trustee Hunsinger abstained due to absence, carried 4/1 that the minutes of the meeting held August 18, 2008, be approved as written.

**GUESTS:**

1. Bill Andrews – Hiking and Biking Trail – B. Andrews asked permission to have the Village Attorney work out a legal agreement with the Town of Sweden Attorney to use a 10 foot strip of Village property off Canal Road near the former landfill along the abandoned trolley bed for the proposed hiking and biking trail to run between Sweden Walker Road and Owens Road.

Mayor Wexler said B. Andrews came to see him and he recommended that he present this to the Village Board. B. Andrews said the Town of Sweden and the County of Monroe entered into a license agreement in late 2006 since the County is the owner of the former Rochester Buffalo Lockport trolley right of way indicating that the Town will enhance, develop and maintain the property as a recreation trail for public uses.

Trustee Wagenhauser asked if a simple motion on the record would suffice or if an easement or a legal agreement is needed. B. Andrews said a simple motion would save time and money, but it might not be enough. He said the County laid out certain conditions in their agreement. Trustee Wagenhauser said he would prefer to receive and review a copy of that agreement before taking any action. Trustee Legg concurred and asked if the hiking and biking trail would be considered a permanent use of the land. Trustee Wagenhauser asked if this would be an exclusive use – only for this purpose. Trustee Castaneda suggested having the Town of Sweden have their attorney draw up the agreement and forward it to the Village Board and Village Attorney for their review. Trustee Hunsinger said he would also like to receive a map of the area in question. Trustee Wagenhauser asked if this is the project where volunteers went out with chain saws a few years ago. B. Andrews said that is the project. It's still a work in progress. Mayor Wexler asked about squaring off the corners of the trail. B. Andrews said they feel that a 10-foot width would allow bicycles to navigate the trail safely. It would be too complicated to create broader curves.

Mayor Wexler said so far it sounds like the Board has no real objections, but does need to take a better look at it. B. Andrews promised to drop off a copy of the map and agreement between the Town and County to Clerk Morelli to forward to the Board.

2. Bill Andrews – Historic Preservation Board – B. Andrews informed the Board that Historic Preservation Board Chair / Architect David Strabel is now ineligible to serve as a member of the Historic Preservation Board since he and his family have recently relocated out of the Village. The Historic Preservation Board met August 28<sup>th</sup> and the membership resolved to have B. Andrews serve as Chair. D. Strabel has agreed to continue for the time being as a consultant to the Board. They have two potential applications to come – architect and archeologist. The Village Board asked Clerk Morelli to contact D. Strabel to request a letter of resignation for acceptance at the next meeting. Clerk Morelli reminded the Board that the usual and customary practice is for a Board or Committee's membership to appoint its own Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary.

**VILLAGE BOARD REPORTS:**

A. Mayor Morton Wexler

- 1. Appoint representative to Monroe County Pre-Disaster Mitigation Planning Committee –

→ Trustee Castaneda moved, unanimously carried 5/0 to appoint Larry Vaughan as the Village's representative on the Monroe County Pre-Disaster Mitigation Planning Committee.

- 2. Accept resignation of part time camera operator Mark Croce – Mayor Wexler shared that due to his college class schedule, M. Croce advised him that he is no longer available on Monday evenings to tape the Village Board meetings.

→ Trustee Castaneda moved, unanimously carried 5/0 to accept the resignation of Mark Croce as part time camera operator with regret and thanks for his service the past 3 months.

- 3. Appoint replacement for part time camera operator – Mayor Wexler asked the Board how they would like to proceed as to a replacement. Trustee Wagenhauser suggested re-advertising the position. Trustee Hunsinger said he would be willing to contact SUNY College at Brockport. Trustee Castaneda said she would be willing to contact Brockport High School, as she did last spring. Clerk Morelli said she would forward the advertisement used last spring and the meeting schedule to Trustee Hunsinger and Trustee Castaneda as well as contact Educable.
- 4. Call for a public hearing on proposed revisions to amended Chapters 27 & 36 – Discussion took place as to possible dates and locations for said public hearing. Clerk Morelli shared available dates at Brockport Middle School Auditorium and adjacent parking lot as: 9/29, 10/1, 10/6, 10/8, 10/15. She had not originally inquired as to availability the week of 9/15 since she and Scott Zarnstorff are each away at conferences. The Village Attorney is unavailable on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

→ Trustee Wagenhauser moved, to schedule a public hearing on proposed revisions to amend Chapters 27 and 36 for 6pm Monday, September 15, 2008 at Village Hall.

Discussion ensued as to whether it was likely that the attendance would surpass the occupancy limit of the Village Hall conference room which is posted for a maximum occupancy of 80 (60 seated and 20 standing) and whether attendance by the Village Attorney was necessary. Mayor Wexler and Trustee Castaneda expressed concern about planning for a large enough venue since the original public hearing scheduled last June at Village Hall that included Village Code Chapter 36 had to be postponed to July at the Middle School auditorium. Trustee Hunsinger asked Clerk Morelli how many were in attendance in July. Clerk Morelli said only 24 people actually signed in to the hearing, but she would have to guess there were 75 to 100 people in attendance.

Trustee Legg suggested the regular Village Board meeting be changed to 6pm with the public hearing to follow.

→ Call to Question: Trustee Wagenhauser in favor, Trustee Legg in favor, Trustee Hunsinger in favor, Trustee Castaneda opposed, Mayor Wexler opposed, carried 3 to 2 to schedule a public hearing on proposed revisions to amend Chapters 27 and 36 to begin at 6pm Monday, September 15, 2008 at Village Hall.

Trustee Castaneda said it seems that some members of the Village Board can't be

inconvenienced, but can inconvenience the public. She stressed the need for a backup plan.

Trustee Hunsinger questioned the need for legal representation at the public hearing. Mayor Wexler read an excerpt from the NYCOM Handbook for Village Officials stating that Trustees do not possess any inherent right to supervise or direct the work of others... that is the responsibility of the Mayor. Mayor Wexler said he believes that counsel should be present.

5. Farmers Market Management – Mayor Wexler reminded the Board of the proposed revisions to the Farmers Market rules and regulations forwarded by current Market Manager Carrie Maziarz as well as his notes and the revisions proposed by Trustee Legg.

→ Trustee Legg moved to adopt the Farmers Market rules and regulations revision dated August 28, 2008 contingent on acceptance by the Brockport Merchants Association.

Discussion:

Trustee Castañeda suggested tabling decision until this can be discussed at a workshop with current Market Manager Carrie Maziarz. She expressed concern over: the recent issue with a new vendor and of a citizen Market Manager entering into agreements or contracts with vendors on behalf of the Village, what liability, if any, the Brockport Merchants Association would have, what liability and insurance the Village would have and the potential for concerns such as the one recently possibly ending up in litigation. She said she would prefer a Village representative work hand in hand with a Merchants Association representative and that the Village Board members take turns overseeing the market on Sundays similar to how they take turns hosting the Summer Serenades concerts. She said she would be willing to Co-Chair it with a member of the Merchants Association.

Trustee Wagehauser said the Village has insurance and each vendor also has insurance. The Merchants Association would not necessarily need to have their own insurance regarding the market.

Mayor Wexler expressed concern over: the Merchants Association being given the power to appoint the Market Manager. He reminded the Board of the Mayor's rights when it comes to making appointments, subject to Board approval. He said he appreciates that the Merchants Association wants to get involved with the Farmers Market and realizes that its existence helps their businesses by bringing people into the downtown district. However, the Village should not relinquish its right to hire or appoint the Market Manager, develop a budget, establish rules and regulations, and establish the location. No matter who sits as Mayor or Trustees, that power should not be relinquished.

Trustee Hunsinger said some good points have been brought up. The Merchants Association would appoint someone as Market Manager as a result of an informed search. They would likely bring that appointment to the Mayor and Trustees. Mayor Wexler said the document does not say that. If it did, he would be more apt to favor it.

Trustee Castañeda said as evidenced by a recent vendor issue, the Market Manager's actions could result in a costly lawsuit. Trustee Wagenhauser said the Village's insurance policy covers litigation. It would not cost the Village.

Mayor Wexler said he is not convinced that the document, as written, is legal. Trustee Wagenhauser reminded the Mayor that there are other ad hoc committees where the Village Board can appoint. The Mayor does not have the authority to appoint everything. He said he suspects this has to do more with one particular merchant. Trustee Wagenhauser said the Village successfully turned over the use of Main Street to the Merchants Association recently for its annual sidewalk sale and street fair. Mayor Wexler said street closure requests and the Farmers Market location is a decision of the Village Board, not the Merchants Association.

Trustee Legg said the Village of Brockport as a sponsor would establish the times and location of the market. As to references of a recent vendor situation, this would have been in response to the actions of the current Market Manager – a former Trustee.

Trustee Castañeda asked if an attorney had reviewed the document, and if not, it should be referred to the Village Attorney. Mayor Wexler said if the Village Attorney reviews it and deems it acceptable, he would not oppose. Until such time, he believes the Village Board should not surrender their rights. He expressed concern of voting on it without checking the legality. He said no one is saying they want to get rid of the Farmers Market.

Trustee Castañeda said the Board had an opportunity to discuss this at the August workshop and invited Market Manager Maziarz who did not attend. The Board could step up and offer to handle alternate Sundays. She said she realizes it is a lot of work and a big commitment, but is willing to do

her share. She said she would think the other elected officials would see this as a good opportunity to be involved and visible to the residents.

Trustee Hunsinger said regardless of whether the Village or the Merchants Association oversees the Farmers Market, he would gladly volunteer his time to assist where needed. That's not the point.

Trustee Castañeda said it is relevant and stressed working with the Merchants Association as a partnership, but not turning it over to them altogether.

→ Call to Question: Trustee Legg in favor, Trustee Wagenhauser in favor, Trustee Hunsinger in favor, Trustee Castaneda opposed, Mayor Wexler opposed, carried 3 to 2 to adopt the Farmers Market rules and regulations revision dated August 28, 2008 contingent on acceptance by the Brockport Merchants Association.

Mayor Wexler indicated that he would forward this to the Village Attorney for review. If there are concerns, the issue would come back to the Village Board for proper action. If it is deemed acceptable, the revised document will stand.

6. July Village Attorney Bill – Mayor Wexler reminded the Board that at least 3 Board members need to sign off on payment of each bill. The Village Attorney's bill for services for the month of July did not receive the necessary number of signatures. The Board asked for and received a more detailed accounting from the Village Attorney.

Trustee Wagenhauser indicated that he did not wish a public discussion of the matter, and that he was not asking the Village Attorney for more detail, but for the Mayor to provide the entire Board with some information as to the numerous calls and conversations logged with counsel. It is only responsible and appropriate that each Board member receive necessary information and thoroughly review the bills.

Mayor Wexler stressed that any further detail on the bills may be FOILable and would not be appropriate. Trustee Wagenhauser stressed that the Mayor should be providing the Board with information, but has decided to make this a political game. This could be accomplished with phone calls or going to executive session. Mayor Wexler questioned why Trustee Wagenhauser doesn't call the entire Board when he contacts the Village Attorney or to relay information on projects he says he is working on – including trying to cut the salary of the Mayor and Board. Calling the Village Attorney costs money. Calling NYCOM (New York Conference of Municipal Officials) is free since we are a member municipality. Trustee Wagenhauser shared that a lot of the information on the Village Attorney billing is not FOILable.

Trustee Hunsinger asked that the Mayor be forthright and give the Trustees the information they need to do their jobs and discussions such as this could be avoided altogether. Trustee Castaneda said if a Trustee calls the Village Attorney, they should jot a note to the rest of the Board summarizing the call.

Trustee Castaneda said the previous makeup of the Board and administration opted not to have the Village Attorney attend Village Board meetings in an effort to save money. However, we seem to spend more money going to him afterwards. Trustee Wagenhauser said travel time and attendance at the July public hearing by the Village Attorney cost about \$1,000. To have him sit here for 2 or 3 hours plus travel to and from the meeting is not cost effective.

Trustee Wagenhauser said he would be willing to sign off on payment of the bill as long as the Mayor agrees to make every effort to fill in the entire Board in the future. He said it is important to avoid this tug-of-war. If he is unable to do this, then the Village has a definite problem in its leadership and is a sad way to do business. Mayor Wexler agreed, but said he does not have a legal background and information may not necessarily be placed in writing. Trustee Wagenhauser said this is a Board, not just a Mayor. The entire Board needs to be kept informed and be made aware of all of the implications. It only drives up costs when each member of the Board has to contact the Village Attorney to get the information it should be getting from the Mayor.

Each Board member signed off on payment of the bill.

B. Trustee / Vice Mayor Maria C. Castañeda

1. Village Advisory Committee – next meets Tuesday, September 9<sup>th</sup> at 7pm at Village Hall
2. Mayors Association Meeting – represented the Mayor at the August 21<sup>st</sup> dinner meeting in which County Executive Brooks made a brief presentation and discussion took place on New

York state budget cuts, challenges, and grant opportunities related to government efficiency and sharing services in an effort to cut costs.

3. Septemberfest – 9/13 – Village participation –

→ Trustee Castaneda moved, unanimously carried 5/0 to participate in Septemberfest scheduled for Saturday, September 13<sup>th</sup> from 10am to 4pm by having a Village information booth set up on State Street.

Trustee Castaneda agreed to take the lead in setting up, staffing, and take down the booth. Clerk Morelli agreed to gather the information and request tables from the Fire Department and tent from the Police Department. Village Historian Jackie Morris and Museum Committee Member Doug Wolcott have agreed to have a museum display and offer museum tours. Trustees Legg and Hunsinger said they support the event and the Village's involvement, but each have prior commitments that day. Mayor Wexler offered to assist Trustee Castaneda in the morning, but has a prior commitment in the afternoon. Trustee Castaneda said she would ask the Step Up Community Project students to assist.

4. Welcome Center Ice Machine – Trustee Castaneda said she spoke with Welcome Center Management Committee Member Bill Andrews regarding the new ice machine and ice at the Welcome Center. He has agreed to keep a separate log of money collected from the sale of bags of ice. This will help to see that the Village recoups the cost of the machine and the ice.

C. Trustee David J. Wagenhauser

1. 100 Fair Street – Trustee Wagenhauser said residents in the Fair Street area have asked him some questions such as: Has the sale closed? Has the new owner applied to the Village for a demolition permit? Is the NYSDEC involved? What steps has the Mayor and Code Enforcement Officer taken regarding the property?

Mayor Wexler said he is unsure if the closing has taken place, but that Kevin Truelson of Hamlin and another gentleman won the bid at the County auction. Mayor Wexler said his understanding was that the NYSDEC found nothing significant there and that if the Village wanted contamination testing done and was willing to pay for it, to do so. Mayor Wexler said he would look into this and advise.

2. Police Patrols – Trustee Wagenhauser commented that it is wonderful to see the Brockport Police walking a beat on Main Street.

3. Pedestrian Crossings – Trustee Wagenhauser shared that the pedestrian crossing signs are up and he has already noticed drivers stopping for crosswalks. If a sign gets damaged, it will be put back up. It is well worth it for safety purposes.

4. Rural Opportunities Grant – Trustee Wagenhauser shared that he expects to receive word on the Rural Opportunities Grant in November.

5. Fire Department – Trustee Wagenhauser read a prepared statement:

Last meeting I spoke of the Police Department and the work they're doing to confront crime in the area. Today, I'd like to speak of the Brockport Volunteer Fire Department and the great job they're doing – specifically regarding their budgeting and cost containment. Recently, the Fire Department's judgment on purchases and finances has come into question by members of this Board and others. I decided to get some facts and find out how the Brockport Fire Department stacks up with other local departments and municipalities. An examination of 2008 County tax bills showed Spencerport the least costly with its cost to taxpayers at 81 cents per 1,000 of assessed value. Just pennies behind, practically in a dead heat, was Brockport and its partners. Brockport oversees the budget for the 3 municipalities of Brockport, Clarkson and Sweden. Brockport at 84 cents per 1,000, Clarkson at 83 cents per 1,000 and Sweden at 86 cents per 1,000. Chili follows at 96 cents per 1,000. Henrietta doubles that to \$1.89 per 1,000. Gates follows at \$1.93 per 1,000. North Greece at \$2.82 per 1,000. Hamlin at \$3.27 per 1,000 which is about 4 times Brockport's cost to taxpayers.

These numbers speak highly of the management of the Brockport Fire Department and of the Village of Brockport's oversight. I'm proud of this efficiency. Moreso, I'm proud of the job these men and women do every day for all of us. By the way, the cost of the new pumper will be paid for with money budgeted. Having this pumper keeps our ISO rating where it should be which keeps all of our property insurance lower.

D. Trustee Scott W. Hunsinger

1. Arts Festival – Trustee Hunsinger congratulated all involved with the Arts Festival and in particular: BISCO, Krys Staub of the Lakeside Foundation and the Kiwanis, Kelly Smith of the Lakeside Foundation, Norm Knight of the Rotary, Gary Zimmer of the Rotary, Greg Lund of the Lions, Bob Reusch of the Kiwanis, Roger Smith of the Brockport Exempts and Fire Department, Sharon Wentworth of the Brockport Merchants Association. Each of the three food booths had many volunteers from the service club representing that booth. All did a great job and went well even with the rain on Sunday.
2. Parks Committee – Trustee Hunsinger shared that the Parks Committee will meet at 9am on September 11<sup>th</sup> to inventory all Village Parks and Playgrounds. The results will be forwarded to the Village Board.

3. September 11<sup>th</sup> Vigil – Trustee Hunsinger reminded all of Brockport Fire Department’s annual hour vigil from 8am to 8pm on September 11<sup>th</sup> at the monument at the 5 corners.
4. School Buses – Trustee Hunsinger reminded all that school is back in session and to be mindful of school buses and safety precautions.
5. Sweden Farmers Museum – Trustee Hunsinger shared that the Sweden Farmers Museum will be holding its Harvest Festival September 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> which would include a drive in movie, a 5K run and a tug of war competition between the Town and Village DPW’s. He challenged his fellow Trustees to run the 5K with him.

**E. Trustee Hal S. Legg**

1. Treasurer Vacancy – Trustee Legg reported that the deadline has passed for the Treasurer vacancy as advertised as part time without benefits. He said he believes the Village would benefit from re-advertising the position to its conventional status as full time with benefits.

Trustee Castañeda asked if any applications were received. Trustee Legg said just a handful, and although grateful to those who applied, they need to deepen the pool. Mayor Wexler said he has always agreed with the position remaining full time and has no problems with Trustee Legg’s proposed revised advertisement.

→ Trustee Legg moved, unanimously carried 5/0 to re-advertise the Treasurer vacancy as full time as follows:
